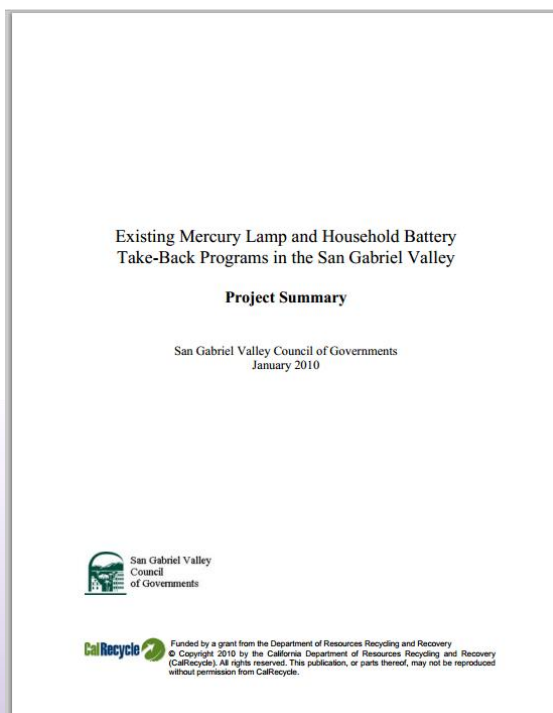

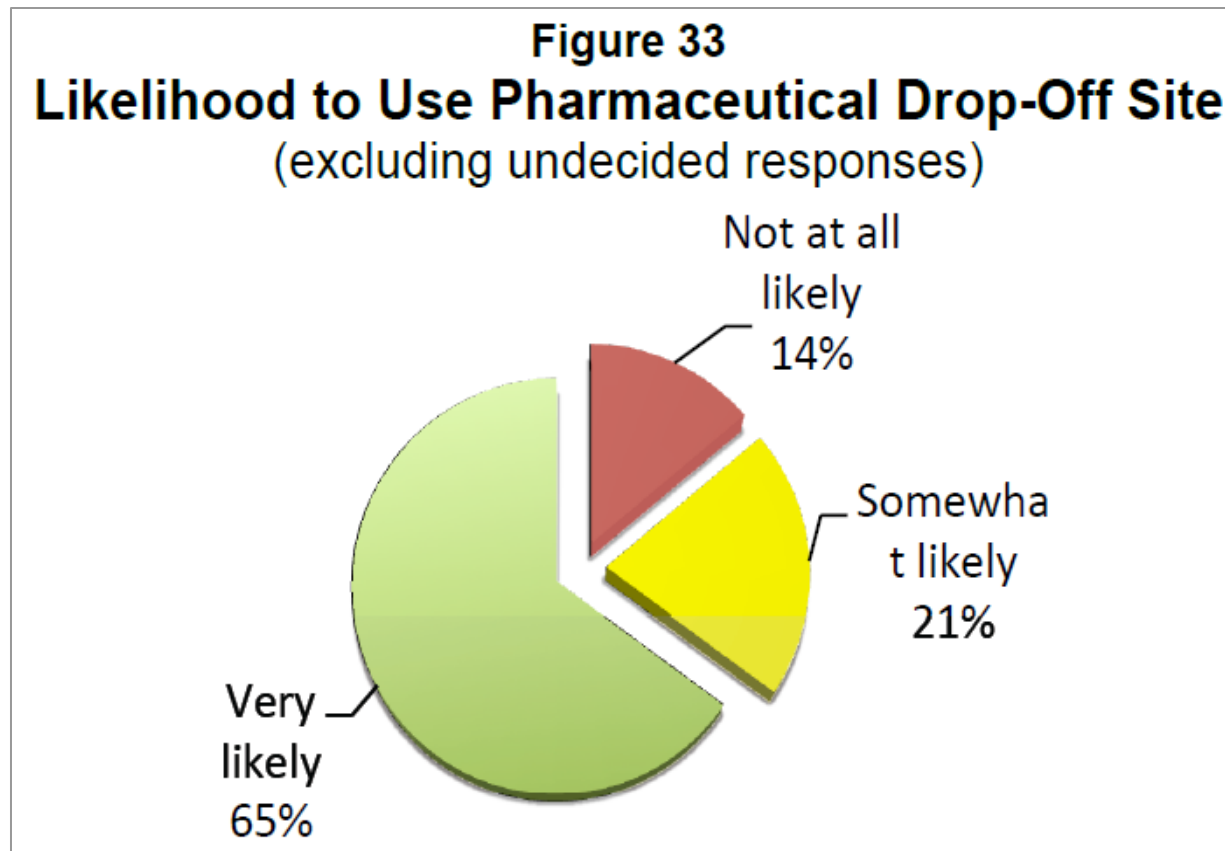

Key Survey Findings Meds (cont.)

Respondents were asked *"If a medication take-back program were to be established, how do you think it should be funded?"* Responses were categorized into the following:

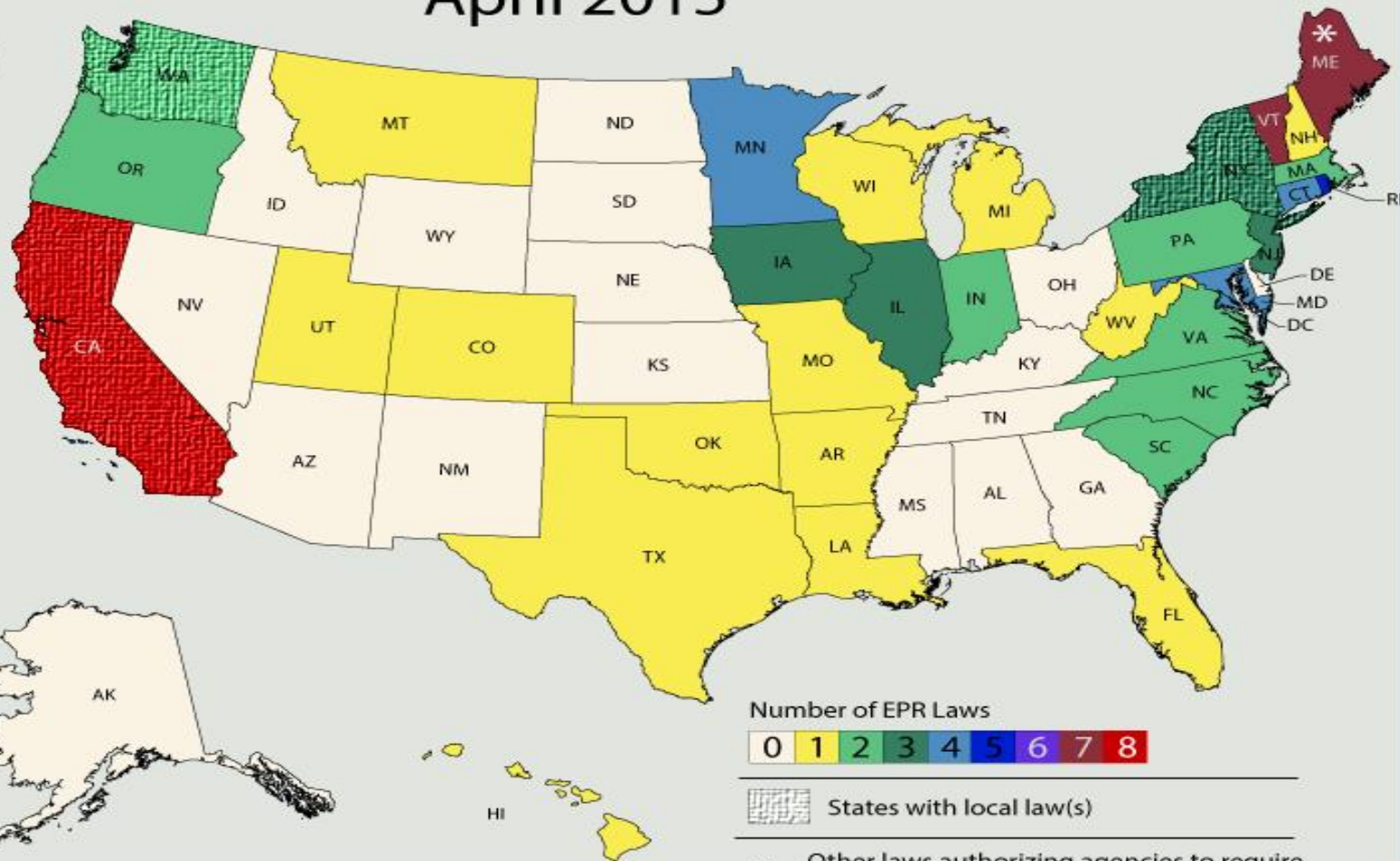

Dear Board Members:

Over the last two years, I have worked with numerous stakeholders to develop legislation that would create a convenient and environmentally responsible home-generated prescription drug disposal program. These efforts included my hosting several large stakeholder meetings, working with legislative consultants, and meeting with hundreds of individuals with an interest in the safe handling and disposal of unused medications. During that time, I introduced two bills, SB 727 (2013) and SB 1014 (2014) in response to the feedback I received to help decrease the supply of unused prescription drugs in homes across California. Due to the current legislative climate, moving forward with these programs was unsuccessful.

I am now respectfully requesting your participation and help to move this critical issue forward in our state. Adopting a county ordinance similar to Alameda County's Safe Drug Disposal ordinance will help California residents prevent prescription drug abuse, address their disposal needs now, and increase support for a statewide solution.

The Alameda County Board of Supervisors unanimously adopted the first Safe Medication Disposal Ordinance in the country in July 2012. Pharmaceutical manufacturers with medications being sold or distributed in Alameda County must participate in and fund a program to collect and dispose of unwanted drugs. The ordinance was challenged by Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America, Generic Pharmaceutical Association, and Biotechnology Industry Organization on the basis that the ordinance violates the dormant Commerce Clause for interstate commerce and discriminates against out-of-county producers. In August 2013, the U.S. District Court upheld the ordinance, as did the Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in September 2014.

CA 2015 State Legislation

AB 45- Mullin

Requires jurisdictions to increase collection of HHW by unspecified percentage; authorize the department to adopt a model ordinance for door to door collection and diversion program to facilitate compliance and require annual report to the department.

Passed out of two committees with 6-3 and 4-2 votes and then held in Appropriations Committee

2 Year Bill which can be taken up again in January 2016

AB 1159 – Gordon, Stone, Williams

Establish product stewardship pilot program requiring producers and product stewardship organization of covered products (home generated sharps or household batteries) develop and implement a product stewardship plan.

Passed out of two committees with unanimous votes and the held in Appropriations Committee

Members of the Alameda County Board of Supervisors:

I express my strong support for the Alameda County Safe Medication Disposal Ordinance and its passage by the Alameda County Board of Supervisors.

I am a firm supporter of extended producer responsibility (EPR) as a policy approach that can reduce waste and improve water quality while protecting public and environmental health. The Alameda County Safe Medication Disposal Ordinance is built on an EPR model that will provide safe and convenient options for disposal of unused drugs to protect the public and aquatic life from pharmaceuticals flushed directly into the water system.

I believe this ordinance is setting a national precedent. When companies and state and federal governments fail to act on environmental issues, it is imperative that local governments are allowed to take action to protect public health and the environment. Alameda County citizens are asking the pharmaceutical industry to share in the responsibility to safely manage waste medications, which the local government can no longer bear alone.

Residential stockpiling of unused household medications leads to easy access and drug abuse by children and teens, and flushing and throwing away medication can harm the environment, including the water we drink.

As with packaging, safe disposal of pharmaceuticals should be a shared responsibility, the costs of which should not fall solely on local governments and taxpayers. Pharmaceutical companies who profit by selling drugs should also share in the end of life cost and work with Alameda County and its many constituencies eager to support a collection program. I applaud Alameda County's leadership and encourage the county to proceed and adopt the ordinance and I hope that this leads to action nationally to provide safe and convenient unused medication stewardship programs funded and operated by the pharmaceutical companies.
